"THE SHOW MUST GO ON"

... or we at least need to continue moving forward.

The simple adage which originated in the circus tents of the 1800's would apply when an actor or animal was injured. It was the duty of the ringmaster to keep things going amid crisis. While we are not faced with an injured elephant or faint actor, Norwalk Arts Center is in a bit of a crisis with the current worldwide corona virus pandemic, as are so many arts entities.

Stay-at-home orders and a ban on gatherings over ten people have affected how Norwalk Arts Center is able to function and how we can raise money for our renovation of the Norwalk Theater. As happens with necessity, we have had to be inventive in the past few months to ensure our initiative continues.

With the postponement of our Ladies' Teacup Auction, Peter Pan Jr performance, Art Explorers Program and dinner theater fundraiser, we have become creative in ways to raise a little money to keep moving forward.

"We really wanted to do something for the community during the pandemic," said Board President Dina Lukasko. "So many of our board members and friends of NAC are crafty and able to sew, and we saw a need we could fulfill." Lukasko and several volunteers were able to produce and distribute masks to our community.

Seeing the community's need for personal protective equipment, NAC began firing up the sewing machines and began sewing. As a team, Norwalk Arts
Center has been able to
produce nearly 2000 fabric
masks, distributing to individuals,
front line workers and local
businesses at no cost. Donations
were accepted but not
expected. Once again, the
community showed their support
for our efforts and over \$4,500
was donated to NAC through the
mask distribution.

"It is the first step in making sure that the theater is safe. Sections of the ceiling have been collapsing due to the saturation of rain water through the roof," said Vanessa Cook, Restoration Co-chair. The community came together again to show its support for the project; several volunteers were crucial to preparing the roof for replacement.

Roofing continued to replace the roof until weak spots in the decking sidelined the project, which was around the same time the stay-athome order became in effect for the State. However, progress continued inside the building. The ceiling demolition has been completed by Erie Environmental. Removal of the remaining seats was completed by board members and their families. Removing the ceiling has allowed for a more complete assessment of the roof, and the reroofing project is scheduled to continue after deck replacement.

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Something to Chair-ish

The first-floor seats that have been removed are the original seats that have adorned this historic theater for almost eighty years. Partnering with several local businesses, NAC is offering the seats to the public as a means to raise funds for continued renovations of the theater. The "Something to Chair-ish" Campaign began in May and gives donors the opportunity to purchase from one to ten seats. Norwalk Fabric Outlet is allowing donors to pick a fabric of their liking and Lesch Upolstery is recovering the seats. Custom Metal Works has prepped seat frames by sandblasting them, and the seat backs and legs will be repainted in one of three color choses.

Only 200 seats will be available for purchase during the fundraiser, which will run through the summer. "We are excited to share the history of the theater with the community. It's their history, too" said Cook. "We were able to sell some seats to other non-profits in January, but we wanted to make sure we had some to offer to donors."





Campaign comes at a critical time. "With all in-person avenues of fundraising suspended, the chair sale will help immensely," said Theresa Barcus, Co-founder of NAC, "We had a set refinished to see how they turned out, and they are on display in the window at NAC@22 (22 E Main St.) These theater seats will make a great addition to your office lobby, home theater, waiting room, or wherever you need a conversation piece. The professional level of craftmanship has transformed the battered seats into something to truly "chair-ish."


